

Evidence shows housing alone isn't enough. Our approach includes the dedicated work of the LifeMoves Outreach teams, who meet people where they are — whether on the streets, in vehicles, or in encampments — and remove obstacles for our unhoused neighbors to enter interim housing. From there, we provide extensive, integrated, customized services and whole-person care to stabilize them, and then support them in transitioning to permanent housing. We partner with people to identify and build their unique strengths and skills so they can take charge of their futures. That's why our approach combines:







PERSONALIZED PATHWAYS

Case Management tailored to each client's housing navigation—whether it's:

- Assistance with accessing Veterans benefits
- The facilitation of reuniting with family members
- Enabling independent living through education of chronic health conditions

DIVERSE AND ACCESSIBLE UNITS

Providing the stability of home through housing options and amenities, including:

- Private living spaces, often with bathrooms and kitchenettes (available at many sites)
- Pet accommodations to help keep families together
- Accessible units to support seniors and clients with disabilities
- 24/7 security that balances safety and independence

WRAPAROUND SERVICES

Interim housing community access to:

- Medical/dental/behavioral health in many locations
- LVN support to monitor key interim housing community
- Job training partnerships across the board

DATA TRENDS

& INSIGHTS IN FY2024

LifeMoves is leaning into data-driven innovation and evidence-based solutions to enhance our impact. We are not only responding to homelessness—we are actively working to end it. With continued investment in our service model, strategic partnerships, and community engagement, we are well on our way to achieving our goal of serving 10,000 clients annually while providing real pathways to permanent housing and stability.



Strategic Growth with Lasting Impact

LifeMoves continues to expand its reach, serving 7,459 unique clients in FY24—an increase of 384 clients over the previous year. This growth aligns with our strategic goal of serving 10,000 clients annually by 2027. However, the need remains high:

Santa Clara County alone has the fourth-largest population of unhoused individuals in the United States.



Rising Numbers of Single and Aging Adults

Two out of three LifeMoves clients in FY24 were single adults, and nearly one-quarter (24%) were aging adults (55+). National trends reflect similar challenges, with the proportion of homeless adults over 50 rising rapidly. Older adults experiencing long-term homelessness also face accelerated aging, and require tailored care models to address their complex health and housing needs.



Responsive Capacity Building

The opening of our 240-unit San Mateo County Navigation Center allowed us to serve 4% more single adults while maintaining our strong commitment to family homelessness solutions through interim housing community like Branham with our flexible family units coming in 2025.



Three Key Client Groups Require Tailored Support

LifeMoves serves nearly equal numbers of first-time homeless individuals (35%), chronically homeless individuals (35%), and those who fall in between (30%). Each group has distinct challenges, from navigating housing barriers to overcoming long-term instability. Our adaptive service model ensures that we meet each client where they are and provide the resources they need to achieve stability.



The Housing Crisis is the Root of Homelessness

For every 100 households seeking affordable housing in our state, only 23 units are available. The median monthly income for LifeMoves clients was \$1,000 in FY24, while the median rent for a one-bedroom apartment was \$3,000. While LifeMoves helps clients stabilize and increase income, the severe lack of affordable housing remains a systemic challenge.



Housing Placements Are Becoming More Challenging

Among single adults exiting LifeMoves programs, only 26% found permanent housing, while 39% moved to temporary housing. Family clients fared better, with 63% securing permanent housing. However, economic trends—including the expiration of COVID-era eviction moratoriums—continue to push more people into homelessness faster than new interim housing community beds and housing solutions can be created.

Launched in FY2024, the Navigation Center has become Northern California's largest modular interim housing community. The center proves what's possible when we:

- Listen to clients → We prioritize people by providing pet-friendly spaces and private units
- ▼ Follow the data → We follow a housing-first framework with interim housing and customized services
- Build robust partnership networks -> Integrated delivery enabling access to medical, dental, behavioral health, legal, and other services
- Prioritize public/private partnerships → Harnessing public funds & leveraging them with private sources of capital to accelerate execution

What sets the San Mateo County Navigation Center apart is how we leverage partnerships to create measurable change —not just services. Our deep experience in interim housing allows us to:

- Amplify partner impact by integrating 15+ strategic providers (healthcare, employment, housing) under one roof.
- Pioneer replicable models, such as our interim housing community dental clinic, developed in partnership with the University of the Pacific's Arthur A. Dugoni School of Dentistry-now a blueprint for other interim housing communities.
- Strengthen the ecosystem with our documented systems of shared tools and operational blueprints that raise standards.


At LifeMoves, we lean into your data to continuously innovate and move forward, improving services and outcomes across our locations and programs. Our client data consistently guides us, allowing us to identify gaps, drive efficiencies, and enhance targeted support.

San Mateo County Navigation Center

Because of your support, we opened Northern California's largest modular interim housing community, designed with direct client input and evidence-based practices. With pet-friendly spaces, private units, and integrated health, legal, and employment services, the San Mateo County Navigation Center sets a new standard for stability—demonstrating what's possible when we blend innovation with compassion.



OUTREACH PROGRAM



- 2058 unique clients across both counties
- 62 permanent housing placements
- 380 temporary housing solutions (shelter placements)

INNOVATION IN ACTION



When data revealed clients moving between encampments, we pioneered individual tracking (not just locations), enabling:

- Seamless handoffs between teams
- Elimination of duplicate paperwork
- 27% faster access to housing (2024 data)

Those 62 permanent placements represent extraordinary impact—equivalent to 4 housing solutions per case manager across our massive service area.

Our outreach teams continue to be effective in both counties. Through our review of data, the team noticed that clients often move from encampment to encampment. To create a seamless continuity of service, the Outreach team reorganized to enable tracking of individuals versus encampments. The team can track individuals who move, and do a warm hand-off between regional teams, avoiding the challenges of re-establishing a relationship with a client and duplicating data, which slows the progress toward accessing services and housing.

LVN Program

Responding to our client health data, which revealed 42 percent suffered from chronic conditions and visit the ER at three times the rate of housed individuals, your contributions enabled us to strategically expand Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) to 8 key interim housing communities. This allowed clients greater access to regular medical checkups, proactive health management, and significantly reduced ER visits through access to innovative interim housing community care.

Through LifeMoves and his dedicated case manager, Elisa, he overcame his initial hesitation to accept help, obtained vital documentation, and connected with mental health services. Now at 24, Victor has stable housing, employment in Pacifica, and is building his future through vocational training.

A skilled tradesman living in his van at San Jose's Columbus Park for three years, Matthew's life changed after a stroke limited his ability to work. Through LifeMoves' housing specialist Alexandra, he qualified for rapid rehousing assistance and moved into his own apartment in January 2023. Now he receives ongoing support with budgeting and stability planning.

A single mother from San Mateo, Crisanta made the difficult choice to leave her daughter with family while battling addiction and depression, eventually living in her car for six months. Through LifeMoves' First Step For Families program, she and her 4-year-old daughter Mia reunited in a supportive environment where they could heal together. Now pursuing her GED and saving for her own place, Crisanta is building a stable future while strengthening family bonds, with dreams of opening her own boutique in San Mateo.

Through LifeMoves' Montgomery Street Inn, he accessed comprehensive services including medical care, therapy, and VA benefits. After a painful divorce at 25 led to struggles with alcohol, Lisa spent over three years living in a shuttle bus and RV with her aging dog Molly, disconnected from family and stability. Now two years in her own apartment, Lisa has rebuilt her life with purpose, expressing herself through art while caring for Molly and maintaining grateful daily routines.






